It is my honor and privilege to write this letter of support for Mrs. Renee Boyte, nominee for the 2019 Student Outreach Award. Through her 19 years of employment at Louisiana Tech University, Renee has continuously and consistently delivered quality service, created a welcoming environment, built strong connections and met the needs of all Louisiana Tech University students in several capacities. It truly is as if this award were create to honor all that Renee does on a daily basis to create the Tech Family feeling for our every one of our students: past, present, and prospective. I have worked with Renee in the School of Human Ecology for 7 years, and it is from this perspective that I write this letter of support.

A perfect example of Renee's ability to create a welcoming environment and build strong connections occurred just yesterday. Renee created a homemade meal to feed our student workers for Student Worker Appreciation week. There are 25 student workers in our department, and yesterday *Renee made each one feel nurtured and valued*.

Renee has a talent for welcoming not only prospective students but also internal transfers to our department. Just last week alone, I received an email from a mother whose daughter is interested in coming to Tech. She explain to me how helpful Renee had been to her and how *impressed* she was by Renee's personal touch. Two weeks ago, I received a call from a grandmother who was looking for support for her grandson. The grandmother explained to me that she had called all over campus looking for help and finally felt someone (Renee) cared. This week, I had a student who transferred to Human Ecology from another department on campus; she told me that after talking with "Mrs. Renee," she knew she had found her Tech home. I am only one faculty member here, and these are just a few recent stories about Renee that have filtered down to me; therefore, I know this is the way Renee treats all students, mother, fathers, and grandmothers. She interacts with students and their families with respect, warmth, and a welcoming Tech Family attitude.

Once students become a part of the School of Human Ecology, Renee continues to let them know they are welcomed and valued. She works tirelessly to make sure that students receive credit for their transfer courses, have accurate files, and are on-track for graduation. For example, she begins to audit student files two quarters before their anticipated graduation to ensure that there are no unexpected complications (or disappointed students and families). Students have confidence in Renee's work and in her oversight of their academic progression.

Renee treats all students equally and with respect. The most poignant example of this fact is that one of our faculty members is the faculty sponsor for PRISM, the LGBTQ student organization. Renee makes note of the pronouns by which student members wish to be referred so that if a student comes by looking for the faculty sponsor, Renee will refer to the student appropriately. This sign of respect is most meaningful because it occurs outside of the student's awareness and beyond Renee's personal experiences. In other words, Renee's welcoming attitude is genuine, and this authenticity is what makes her stand out to students, parents, and faculty.

Finally, as I was writing this letter, I decided to go to our student computer lab and *ask students* their impressions of Mrs. Renee. This was a Thursday afternoon, right before the holiday break, and there were five students working on assignments. Here are the quotes I recorded from these five random Human Ecology students:

"No matter what it is, she offers to help immediately. She doesn't try to pass it off on someone else. She just helps you in any way she can. And she doesn't seem to be put off by it."

"She is so quick to respond to you. If I send her an email or call, she gets back to me with an answer super-fast. It's amazing."

"She's always available to help."

"She's always so nice and polite to students. She never acts rude to us."

"You can always count on her. She always has a Scantron, too!"

"As an office worker, I see her interact with students all the time, and she treats everyone the same helpful way."

This student quote seems to sum it all up:

"She's willing to do whatever it takes to help a student, whether it's her job or not."

As that final student quote indicates, Mrs. Renee Boyte is the ideal recipient for the 2019 Student Outreach Award. Louisiana Tech University is a special place for students because of special staff like Renee Boyte, who genuinely respects students, has their best interests as her top priority, and is willing to do "whatever it takes" to help them. The Tech Family is fortunate to have Renee Boyte as one of its members for 19 years. I encourage you to show Renee just how much we appreciate all 19 years of her outstanding service to students, their families, faculty, and staff by presenting her the 2019 Student Outreach Award.
