Student Outreach Award Committee:

I am humbled to have been nominated for the 2019 Student Outreach Award by the University Senate Members and Administrators. It is with respect to the nomination that I share a part of my Tech story with you.

My journey at Louisiana Tech started long before I ever began as a student. I follow a long line of educated women starting with my great—grandmother, Lillie Leona Driggers Mall, who graduated in 1911 from Louisiana Industrial Institute. My grandmother- Mildred Mall Dickson graduated in 1935, and my mother- Jane Dickson Boone, in 1967. I was honored to have followed behind as a fourth generation graduate in 1995. I share this bit of history with the committee to explain why family...particularly Tech family... is more than just a phrase to me. I also share it because I want the students that I encounter to know that regardless of blood relatives, each student is family to me. I want to be a part of their Tech story: *their* Tech family.

While an undergraduate at Louisiana Tech, I began working as a student employee in February of 1992. I worked my through graduate school and was hired full-time once I completed my Master of Science degree in the Spring of 1997. I married my high school sweetheart and we moved to south Louisiana in 1998. We returned to Ruston and I was re—hired by Residential Life in February of 2000; I have been back at the University ever since.

For the next 19 years, I had the opportunity to serve the University, students, and parents in a variety of ways. I supervised student employees, graduate

assistants, and coordinators on day-to-day activities. Some of my favorite tasks were going to the Residence Halls and visiting with residents. Other high points were interviewing students to serve as staff members for our department. However, above everything else my favorite thing to do on a daily basis was to speak personally with students to find a connection with them: a bond that would help us develop relationships by helping to better understand cultures and moral compasses. I have valued my time spent with students over the years and grown to love quite a few! I am the proud college mom, also known as "Momma Mel" to many a Bulldog. Whether it was having a student over to eat supper at my home or getting to the bottom of a roommate conflict, I was far more blessed by these students than I could have ever imagined.

In 2014, I had the opportunity to start a new program from the ground up and work with students in more of a joint Student Development and Academic Enhancement setting: the Bridge to Bulldogs. The venture allowed me to work with students and families by recruiting students that thought they could not be admissible to the University and creating relationships with them sight unseen. It also allowed me the opportunity to build a relationship with faculty members and work with the academic side of the house. This part of the process has been the most intimidating to me for various reasons. One of those was because we have some incredible faculty members who are extremely talented and highly knowledgeable in the field of mathematics (of which I am not). I really struggled at what I believed to be the best way to approach such colleagues. Let me just say this: WOW! This group of faculty and administration took the time with an already busy schedule and course load to meet with me regularly to discuss how we could better serve students both educationally and support their overall well being.

My favorite part of my job is the mentoring component. The Bridge to Bulldogs Program requires several extra steps that regularly admitted students do not have to follow. The specified coursework must be adhered to, but in addition, each student must maintain hours of tutoring as well as weekly visits with me. My goal during these meetings is not merely to see how they are doing academically, but also to make every effort to connect personally with these students. I want to know about their families and what they miss about from home while at college. I believe that in many cases when students can talk about things and reminisce, it doesn't make them quite as sad. It's like looking back on good memories or happy thoughts and smiling. On the same token, my students are free to share with me about times in their lives that they DON'T want to repeat and long to grow from past mistakes; a chance to address "the elephant in the room" and move on. Whatever scenario is presented, my students have the chance to be in a place where they can be comfortable, know that some tough questions may be asked, but leave knowing that someone cares about their inmost being. I know that all students are not going to have the same experiences or be cut from the same mold. I do know, however, that all students deserve for me to be kind, caring, and committed to helping them become productive citizens of our University and world.

I am proud to be both an alum and employee of this University. I am also looking forward to adding more students to our Tech family. Thank you for the opportunity to share my story with you.

I am pleased to have the opportunity to submit a recommendation letter on behalf of Mrs. Melanie Peel for the Student Outreach Award. Prior to 2014, I only knew of Melanie by her positive reputation on campus. When I became the Academic Director for the Mathematics and Statistics Program in Summer 2014, I began working with Melanie and others on the Bridge to Bulldogs (Bridge) Program for students who fail to meet Louisiana Tech's admission criteria. That is, Bridge students meet all University admission criteria with the exception of Math ACT. Without the Bridge program, these students would not even be allowed to attend Louisiana Tech!

Bridge went through a transformation in 2014-15 due to changes from the Louisiana Board of Regents. I can attest that from that time, Melanie and her team engaged me and necessary mathematics faculty as partners in the endeavor. The Bridge program has become a true academic-student affairs partnership. Melanie and her team have deferred to the expertise of the team regarding the mathematical content, and we have deferred to the student affairs staff to deliver the program according to best practices. Consequently, we have an excellent relationship of mutual respect between the divisions. Melanie has been a great help to me personally in working with other parts of campus to introduce new mathematics courses that we have also used in the Bridge program.

I am amazed by Melanie's passion for and commitment to the Bridge students. She meets with all Bridge students on a regularly scheduled basis. When students fail to make their appointments with her, she tracks them down like a concerned mom. In our regular meetings, we spend considerable time discussing the needs of the students and particular students who are not performing well in the mathematics course. Melanie follows up with these students to try to understand the situation, which requires, in some cases, very difficult conversations and sometimes tough love. I often think that I'm glad it's Melanie having those conversations and not me! She really has a special talent for interacting with these students and keeping them on track. She exudes care for them, both as Tech students and as human beings.

I have also been impressed that Melanie builds excellent relationships with Bridge students and their parents starting in the initial recruitment phase. Even in cases where students are not successful in Bridge, Melanie continues to interact with the students and their families to try to identify the best academic fit for the student, even if it is not at Louisiana Tech. Melanie is a real asset to Tech and the Bridge program.
