I also assist with organizing the Center's municipal forums and TTC specialty schools, in which individuals from all over the world attend. I serve as the center's budget manager, event planner, online registration website manager, payroll processor, administrative coordinator, and supervisor to students and part-time office staff, as well as participate and travel to some TTC conferences. The TTC is primarily funded by our Industry Advisory Board and grants, so it's important that I control our costs, yet not sacrifice the quality of our work. I analyze areas where we can reduce our costs, while monitoring how our resources are being used. I'm always searching for new

ways to better utilize our limited resources. A lot of my workload involves interactions outside of the University, so I have to stay focused and organized (my planner and the calendar are good friends to me), especially when interacting with companies and industry supporters outside of the U.S., as well as those within the U.S. With organizing events in the U.S. and abroad, it's important that I'm at work and that I stay conscious of the time zone differences, in order to stay on top of my job duties. Most days, I work after hours on campus, as well as at home. I always try to attend all functions that we have at the University and in the Ruston area to ensure that the event is a success.

Most of my duties at the TTC are fast paced, so there is never any downtime. The most fascinating part of working at the TTC is its unpredictability. Some days I don't know what or how many tasks will need to be accomplished or what role I must play. There is nothing routine about my job duties at the Center. I adore my job responsibilities because they fulfill, first and foremost, the one thing that is required of all mankind, for each us to serve one another, and it helps me to exercise my faith—I believe I can do all things. Through interactions with faculty, staff, students, exchange students, industry supporters, class and forum participants, and clients abroad, bonds and friendships are formed that are so rewarding and fulfilling. It is very important to be able to work well others, so I make every effort to foster a healthy work environment. A lot of the faculty, staff, and students at the TTC are not natives of the U.S., so it's extremely important to me to make their new home feel like a place they can truly call home. It is not uncommon to see me in the office enjoying a good conversation with students in the late evening hours after the regular work hours. My reward is the service I provide, and that is what keeps me motivated and ready for another day to serve at the TTC and my community. I serve as a board member for Habitat for Humanity, and I contribute to and support other organizations within the community and nationwide. Ultimately, service is all mankind's purpose.
