The purpose of this letter is to support the nomination of Mrs. Debbie Inman, Director of the Center for Entrepreneurship and Information Technology (CEnIT), for the 2021 Louisiana Tech University Loyalty Award. Mrs. Inman is an ideal candidate for this award because she truly embodies the tenets of Tech while also displaying extraordinary levels of loyalty and dedication to her students and the university at large. The most obvious display of these qualities come through her activities as a student advisor and as the leader of the annual entrepreneurship competition called the New Venture Championship.

Debbie advises students who earn a degree in Management with a concentration in Entrepreneurship. These students have a strong focus on gaining expertise across a number of area including business management, startup activities, technology, negotiation, financial literacy, and networking to assist in fundraising activities. Advising students with this array of needs can be extremely challenging. Mrs. Inman goes above and beyond her normal duties to simply schedule classes. She provides students with an entire curriculum plan, quarter by quarter, and updates this plan with them during each advising period. She counsels students concerning their academic performance as well their life goals. All entrepreneurship students must compete in the New Venture Championship because their senior level classes require it. Debbie does an exceptional job motivating freshmen, sophomore, and junior standing students to compete in the competition as many times as possible prior to those required courses. She knows that interacting with customers, suppliers, lawyers, engineers, and financial institutions throughout their time at Tech will effectively prepare the students to take the next step and eventually launch their own private enterprise. The result is that Mrs. Inman mentors her students and their many entrepreneurial teammates over a four year period. These meetings often take place across campus, at late hours, and with little assistance.

The entire planning process for the New Venture Championship is developed and executed by Mrs. Inman. She also teaches or has developed several multidisciplinary courses over the years that coincide with the timing of New Venture Championship events. Her ability to accomplish this level of coordination is even more impressive when considering the fact that she has to meet the needs of students pursuing degrees in business, engineering, fashion merchandising, architecture, health, etc. This is an extraordinarily difficult process and she does this with confidence, integrity, enthusiasm, and pride.
