## Wes Cavin 5/9/2022

Dear Members of the University Senate,

It was truly an honor to learn that I have been nominated for the Loyalty Award for unclassified staff. In my role at Tech, I am often in meetings with student leaders when the question is asked: "What tenet of Tech do you most associate with?" For me, the tenet that I most associate with is and has always been Loyalty. Although my professional time at Tech has only spanned 8 years, my Louisiana Tech loyalty began to grow nearly 25 years ago. I sincerely appreciate this opportunity to briefly share some of the reasons that I have loved this University and will always be loyal to it.

I grew up in the small town of Vidalia, Louisiana. My parents were not in a financial position to send me to college and I don't believe they understood the value of going to college. Thankfully, I was blessed with a young uncle who set a path for me to follow and in the absence of my biological father, my uncle acted as a big brother who gave me wisdom and guidance. My uncle recognized that our best shot at having a better quality of life than what our family provided was to go to college and he was afforded the opportunity to study at Louisiana Tech University. Throughout middle school and high school, my uncle would invite me to spend weekends and school breaks with him at Tech. Whenever I'd visit, I'd sleep on the floor of his room in Hutcheson Hall and we'd go to the Lambright to play racquetball, to the cafeteria to eat, to Tech sporting events, concerts, and so much more. I had the opportunity to experience Louisiana Tech in a very cool way at a young age and my love for this University began to grow tremendously. In high school, there was no second option for what I would do after graduation. I was going to be a bulldog just like my uncle. I was going to find a way to leave the struggles of my childhood in Vidalia and enter a new world that I felt would give me opportunities that I otherwise would not have. I mostly had to finance my own way through college, but thankfully Tech was an affordable option and so I continued my Louisiana Tech journey as an undergraduate in 2005.

In my sophomore year at Tech, I was given the opportunity to become an RA. I was able to serve in Neilson Hall. I remember a dad asked me on my first day of work if the ceiling tiles and mattresses were the same as when he lived there in the 70s. I chuckled and arranged for the ceiling tiles to be replaced and for a new mattress for the student and my goal became helping students to feel like Louisiana Tech was their "home" despite not maybe having all of the luxuries they had at their parent's home. I did this by trying to create a community where relationships could flourish. I helped students to get involved and to engage in the Tech culture and I believe that I was able to help many of my residents feel like they were home at Louisiana Tech.

Despite a few major changes, I graduated in four years and two quarters with my bachelor's degree in Business Management and Entrepreneurship. Immediately after graduation I served as the Camp Director of MedCamps of Louisiana. During my tenure at MedCamps, I always looked for opportunities to partner with Louisiana Tech. I helped identify the first project for the Design Build Architecture course with Mr. Robert Brooks and Mr. Brad Deal. I also always made sure we had Louisiana Tech students hired as counselors because I felt like our students were simply the best. In 2014, I was provided with an opportunity to come back to Tech, this time in a professional capacity, serving as the Director of Alumni Relations. Ms. Corre Stegall, Mr. Ryan Richard, and Mrs. Jennifer Riley took a chance on me and I will forever be grateful to them for their belief in me to represent Tech. There were not many opportunities that would have motivated me to leave MedCamps but the chance to serve my Alma Mater in a professional capacity was an opportunity that I could not resist.

As the Director of Alumni Relations, I had the opportunity to invite alumni from all over the country to re-engage with Louisiana Tech. I loved getting to hear stories from other alumni about their time at Tech. It was a natural fit for me to serve in the Alumni Association. I bleed bulldog blue and I think alumni respected that. I stayed in this role until 2017, when I accepted the position of Director of Student Activities. This gave me the opportunity to invest more closely in students along with my wife, who at the time was working in Residential Life.

Through my wife's work, we had the opportunity to move onto campus and really serve the students in a unique capacity. We lived in Harper Hall for 2 years and later we moved to the new Aswell Suites, where we brough our fourth child home from the hospital to a small, 800 square foot apartment and lived for another 2 years. It was not uncommon for us to host students at our home for holidays when they didn't or couldn't go home or to throw birthday parties for students who had become our "adopted" children. Even birthday parties for our own children usually had mostly college students as guests. Our family expanded by several hundred people as a result of us working and living on campus.

As the Director of Student Activities, I get the opportunity to serve as direct advisor of SGA and Union Board. We collectively work together to continue to promote many Louisiana Tech traditions. Every day is different and there is no way to simply describe my role. I spend most of my days helping to plan events for the entire student body or identifying ways to make campus better for our students. I have administrative oversight over all student organizations and as such I get to work with nearly 200 student leaders, helping them to build soft skills that often have as much impact on professional success as content knowledge. Every day, I get to reminisce about my time at Tech and help others to come to love Tech the way I do. I believe in meeting students where they are, and as such I spend many late nights engaging with our students at meetings and events. I am accessible at all times to our students, even when I am not on campus because I think it helps them to see my commitment to serving them.

I have grown up around Louisiana Tech, and in my 8 years of professional service to Tech, my family has grown up on campus. We have been blessed with so many cherished relationships with other faculty and staff, alumni, and a new group of students each year. I earned my MBA from Tech while having four children and working in Student Activities full time. I think growing up in poverty and having to work so hard to graduate helped me to have a greater appreciation of the opportunities that I have been given, thanks to Louisiana Tech. I have become a better version of myself than I ever could have imagined because of the people who have walked through the beautiful halls and who have taken pleasant walks with me. My children have played around the noble trees that charmed me in my college days and those days will always be dear to me. The work is seldom easy, but it is always worth it. Louisiana Tech University has given so much to me and because of this I will ever loyal be to thee, my Alma Mater.

Thank you for considering me for this award and for the opportunity to share my story with you.
