## Interview:

Mr. Frank, thank you for your service to Louisiana Tech University, since 1979. Your colleagues have nominated you for the Outstanding Service Award- Classified. Mr. Frank what does this nomination mean to you?

It means a great deal to me. I'm honored!

Thinking back from 1979, what have you enjoyed most about your time at Louisiana Tech University?

You know, I've seen a lot of changes. So much has improved since 1979, and things were a lot harder back in the day. We had to do a lot of work to get the campus to where it is today. I have seen a whole lot of changes. But you know, everything needs change, and to witness that change makes me feel good. I have worked with four presidents now: Drs. F. Jay Taylor, Dan Reneau, Les Guice, and now Jim Henderson. You know what I have enjoyed is being able to witness the change, work outdoors, and more importantly, the people. The people make work enjoyable.

You know sometimes I will be shopping, and someone will say, "Hi, Mr. Frank" and I will turn and ask them how I know them. One time when I was in the mall, a man replied, "I graduated in the 90's" and then we shared stories about the campus. Visits like this happen to me often and make me feel so good.

Could you share a time when you went above and beyond your job responsibilities to ensure the grounds were well kept?

I've worked during ice storms and after the tornado. Cleaning up fallen trees and the long hours to get the campus back to operating. Back in the day, we used to have a call out system and when the phone would ring, I would be back to campus making sure we could function.

What does it mean to be recognized for your hard work?

It is an honor; I do appreciate this recognition. This makes me feel good that our university recognizes hard work. If you work hard, you should be recognized. I thank them.

Mr. Frank what do these letters of support mean to you? (Letters of support were presented).

When interviewed by grounds leadership (Zach Mays and Lane King) they shared that Mr. Frank's commitment to maintaining the beauty of our campus grounds is unparalleled.
