Dear University Senate,

Thank you for your consideration for the Student Outreach Award: Unclassified. Serving as a Student Success Specialist in the College of Engineering and Sciences (COES), I am devoted to our student's academic, social, and emotional well-being and am honored to be recognized as a leader in our University's student success initiative.

Since arriving at Louisiana Tech University (LA Tech) in 2021, I have acted as the main academic advisor for over 2,000 first-year COES students, maintaining consistent communication, advice, and support throughout the academic year. In my student-facing role, I help finalize student course schedules, meet with students on academic probation to create plans for success, and provide a listening ear for both triumphs and setbacks. In my faculty-facing role, I address faculty concerns regarding class attendance, grades, and personal issues by actively engaging with faculty members, providing support to students, and facilitating communication between both parties.

Outside of my traditional job expectations, I have organized and promoted subject-specific study nights, while creating an updated list of student tutors across a range of COES subjects. In addition, I have served as the lead for multiple sizeable COES events, including the Freshman Enrichment Program (FREP), TECHniques for Success, and the COES Outstanding Junior and Senior Awards. And though student academics are always my primary concern, I am lucky to work in a college that prides itself on a fun and welcoming culture that recognizes students as more than their educational profile. This has allowed me to be an active member of previously established COES events, including Gumbo Fest, Spring Release, football tailgates, and etiquette dinners.

Before LA Tech, I worked as a special education/elementary education teacher for seven years. This past fall, I returned to the classroom, teaching multiple COES FYE courses. I also worked with instructors to create and implement college-specific standards and assessments for all COES FYE sections. My experience in elementary education has aided in the planning of events for

COES students (e.g. *Pancakes and Planning, Welcome to Workday Waffles, Nacho Average Advising*, etc.). Fully recognizing the humor and silliness of these initiatives in a higher education setting, I have found that by combining student awareness, responsibility, and conscientiousness with socialness, culture, and fun, we can provide a safe and open environment for students to grow in all aspects of their young adult lives.

Importantly, my commitment to the LA Tech community goes beyond only that of our students, as I take great pride in being a trusted resource to the COES faculty and staff. I frequently handle faculty concerns, questions, and needs. I see faculty and staff as the backbone of our University, and believe their happiness and retention is as crucial to our overall culture and success as that of our students. This year alone, I arranged back to school gifts, brown bag lunches, an appreciation breakfast, several raffles, and sent student-written words of appreciation to over 70 faculty members. I hope to continue to grow these initiatives in the future.

Outside of COES, I strive to stay informed and involved in other parts of campus. Knowing the latest happenings in places like the BARC, Counseling Center, Career Center, and BCC ensures that I can connect students with relevant resources. I serve on the Career Center Campus Networking Group and as a co-PI on the Noyce Cyber Teach – LA grant in collaboration with College of Education and Human Sciences faculty. Both memberships have broadened my understanding of campus-wide initiatives and allow me to provide students with up-to-date and accurate information.

Moving forward, I will continue to give my all to the students, faculty, and staff of LA Tech. I will also work to expand my ability to keep up with the ever-evolving nature of higher education. To this end, I graduated with an MA degree in Counseling and Guidance: Human Services in March of this year. I pursued this program to enhance my knowledge and skills in advising, counseling, and mentoring students. Ultimately, I am grateful for the opportunity to be a part of the LA Tech community and hope to continue to make our workplace one everyone can be proud of and enjoy.

It is my honor to recommend Carly Spinazzola for the Student Outreach Award. It has been my pleasure to get to know her for the last 2-1/2 years both as a supervisor, colleague, and friend. I hired her as a Student Success Specialist for the College of Engineering and Science. Her background is more closely related to teaching in the K12 system, but it was obvious to see that she would be a fantastic addition to our team, and would easily relate to college level students. As a Student Success Specialist, she is one of the primary contacts for undergraduate students. This includes advising and counseling of students on both academic and personal matters. I have seen first-hand how she personally connects with and helps students.

Shortly after her coming to our college we had a transition where she immediately took on a much bigger scope and role to her position. The typical Student Success Specialist would have around 300 students assigned to her as an advisor. For close to half of the time that she has been here, she has had over 1000 students. She has taken on this responsibility and found ways of creating efficiencies so that each student is able to still feel appreciated. She has also trained multiple other Specialists so that more attention can be given to all students.

It is easy to see that she carries a significant amount of workload, but she additionally has been a foundational component to pushing the culture within the college. Culture is more than events, or popcorn, or tailgates. It is about making sure that all the events and the environment are welcoming to all students. Just in the last couple of months she has been the driving force behind creating "Pancakes and Planning" so that students are well aware of when advising is and that they are ready to be successful. "Waffles and Workday" has been used to make sure students are prepared with what to expect with new changes. She coordinates smaller study groups and puts together tutoring resources.

She has always been a tremendous resource for students, but after being here a short time she recognized that she would like to continue her education even further by pursuing a graduate degree in counseling. She has since completed this masters program so that she can further assist students in their academic and personal journey.

She has a way of being able to communicate with students that seems to break down any barriers or concerns that they have while also making sure they understand their own personal accountability. She is able to determine what the student really needs to hear or who they need to meet with. Carly has made great connections throughout the university, and is able to make a call or send an email and quickly get the student whatever help they need. She regularly works closely with the Louisiana Tech Counseling Center, Career Center, and many other resource offices on the campus.
